# What is an IEP resume?

This gives their team an opportunity to connect through established interests to build a relationship.</p>		<p><b>Vision Statement:</b></p> <p>What do you hope your child's future could be? What you want your time and effort to be invested in. Reach for the stars. This can help shape your child's IEP to be even more individualized</p>	
<p><b>Strengths:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>•</li></ul> <p>What activities, manners, character, etc. does your child excel at?</p> <p><b>Challenges:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>•</li></ul> <p>What activities, manners, character, etc. does your child have a hard time with?</p>		<p><b>What works for me:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>•</li></ul> <p>How does your child stay motivated while doing a task? What tips can you provide your team to help engage your child and encourage them to do the best that they can?</p>
